## Ole and Lena's Bars (Danish Preserve Bars)

This dessert was presented to the members of the Larsmont community by Margaret Glass at the annual Larsmont Community Club Picnic in 2012.

1-3/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 tsp. baking soda  
1/2 tsp salt  
1-1/2 cups uncooked (old fashioned) oats  
1 cup butter, softened  
1 cup brown sugar, packed  
1 cup preserves (use your favorite preserves -  
I use Blackbury's Raspberry preserves)  
1/2 cup finely chopped walnuts (if desired)

#### Lemon Glaze:

1 cup powdered sugar  
2 Tbsp. lemon juice



Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Mix together flour, baking soda, salt and oats. In a separate bowl, cream butter. Add brown sugar to the butter gradually and cream until fluffy. Stir in flour mixture.

Reserve 1/3 of crumbs for topping. Firmly press remainder on bottom of greased 9x13 inch pan. Spread preserves carefully over layer in pan (keep about 1/2 inch from pan edge.)

Sprinkle with reserved topping and nuts (if desired). Bake at 400 degrees for about 25 minutes. Cool pan slightly on wire rack, drizzle with lemon glaze. Cut into bars while slightly warm.

Lemon glaze: Mix together 1 cup powdered sugar and 2 Tbsp. lemon juice.

Note: I find the bars are tastier if your layer of preserves is not too thick.

# Larsmont Yesterday - a History

The following is the second excerpt as written from the short history book *Larsmont Yesterday*, written by Oliver Isackson (1906-1970) and published in July 1980 by Irene Hill Norgard. ## INDUSTRIES

**Logging.** Logging pulpwood was the first industry in Larsmont. In 1905, Hickox and Gillen had a logging camp at the site of Dr. Wallace's home at the eastern side of Larsmont. That camp burned down in the 1918 forest fire. The place where the logging was done was called "Hickox Hill." The Williams logging outfit and saw mill was located at the site of Keinonen's Store, and another logging company was at the site of Mrs. Sundstrom's home. Victor Sjoblom had pulpwood at his dock, and an old railroad went from his place to Knife River. The Alger Smith Line was built in 1898 and picked up timber. It was abandoned in later years. Charles Hill and John Coson had a saw mill in 1916 – and after the forest fire of 1918, John Strom operated a saw mill.

**Commercial Fishing.** This was first done by Mr. Hart at Marble Siding, a few miles east of Larsmont.

Then in 1888, the Thompson brothers settled here and began fishing. In 1902, Eric Johnson fished at Marble Siding, and in 1918 the Johnson family settled in Larsmont. The Goldish Co. of Duluth fished and freighted along the North Shore. Cargo boats and sometimes sailboats were used to pick up fish from the fishermen along the shore. Regular trips were made up the shore, and the fishermen would row out to them with their fish.

**Boat Building.** In 1916, Charles Hill and John Coson began building boats where the Barthell cabins now are. They built a fleet of small freighters, 65 feet long, called the "Mosquito Fleet." They built the *Esther M.*, *Esther A.* and *Goldish*, and also did work on the *Thor* and *Alvina*.

In the 1930s, Mr. Hill built the *Crusader I* and *Crusader II* for Carl Erickson of Knife River. On June 16, 1939, Crown Prince Olav of Norway,

during a brief visit to Duluth, was in Knife River to christen the new 35-foot *Crusader II* by smashing a bottle of Lake Superior water against the bow. It was an unforgettable experience for the Norwegians of Larsmont also, especially, the Thompson brothers and Ole H. Isackson. Following are some excerpts from the Duluth newspapers of that day:

"Crown Prince Olav of Norway thrilled a large gathering of Knife River, Larsmont and Two Harbors people Friday with his presence at Knife River. ... The prince singled out Theodore and Tollof Thompson of Larsmont, who have braved Lake Superior in fishing for the past 56 years, and chatted with them while viewing the storm which lashed the shore, and discussed the fishing industry of their native land. ..." "Happy men, too, were Theodore and Tollof Thompson, native Norwegians, who have been fishing off the North Shore for 56 years. The prince laughed and chatted with them while viewing Lake Superior's bristling whitecaps from a fishing dock leading into the water – and when he was about to leave later singled out the brothers for a last handshake. 'Oh, there you are,' he said as he looked into the faces of the crowd surrounding his car about to take him back to Duluth. He extended his hand to Theodore, 76 years old, and Tollof, 72 years old, with 'Good-by now and good luck. Good-by all, good-by,' as he waved his hand. ... Among others presented to Prince Olav was Ole H. Isackson, Larsmont. ..."

Mr. Hill also built an excursion boat for use at Isle Royale, several sailboats for pleasure, fishing boats for Knife River fishermen, as well as numerous skiffs for North Shore fishermen.

**Post Office.** At first this settlement was known as Milepost 22. In order to have a post office, a name had to be decided on. One suggestion was Thompsonville, but there were other places with similar names. Most of the settlers had come from Larsmo, Finland, and they wanted to name it that, but the post office inspector suggested it should be a more American name, so they decided on **Larsmont** ... the "mont" because of the hills in the background. Gust Mattson, a brother of Mrs. Charles

Hill, was instrumental in this. On August 10, 1915, the first post office was established, with John Strom as postmaster. The mail bag was carried from the Strom home to the train and dispatched to Duluth. In 1919, John Sjoblom took over the post office and had it until 1935. Then Oliver Isackson was postmaster until his retirement in 1965. The mail came by train until 1950, and after that by postal truck from Duluth. After Ollie's retirement, his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Charles (Sandra) Isackson, was postmistress for some months, after which Ray Keinonen had the post office in his store, until he sold to James Kinlow in 1977. It was a sad day in 1978 when "Uncle Sam" chose to close our little post office, after 63 years of service to our community.

**Business Places.** The first store was owned by John Strom, in connection with the post office, between 1915 and 1919. Then Charles Hill had a store around 1920. In the 1930s, Ingvald Jacobson had a store, and Oliver Isackson operated a store and gas station from 1929 to 1965. Several have occupied "Ollie's Store" since his retirement, but is now out of business. Gordon Hendrickson also had a store, around 1940-1941.

**Contractors & Builders.** Hill and Strom were contractors and builders from 1913 to 1938. They built the Larsmont school, which was opened in 1914 ... also schools in Beaver Bay, Wales and Knife River Valley. The I.O.O.F. Building in Two Harbors (now owned by the Grace Baptist Church) was erected and dedicated in 1923.

**Tourist Cabins.** The tourist cabin business was started in the late 1920s by John Hendrickson. Many others along the shore then built cabins and it became quite a thriving summer occupation. The height of the cabin business was reached in 1936. There were about 100 cabins in Larsmont.

**Other Businesses.** There also was chicken farming by Oliver Isackson, turkey raising by Mr. Juenemann, a silver fox farm operated by the Jensen Brothers and mink farms by Maynard Kaldor and Lloyd Sande.
